



CHAPLAIN'S CHAT

REVEREND NOEL OAKEY

There have been two musicals over the past twenty years that I can see again and again. One in particular, I have seen six times on stage by different theatre companies. *Les Miserables* is the great story of unconditional forgiveness. I cannot see the live production or the movie version without being reduced at times, to tears... and "the Greatest Showman" has no different an effect upon me.

In fact, I think the opening song(s) of The Greatest Showman are so moving.



The musical is loosely based on the story of P.T. Barnum, who brings together a group of social outcasts to form a stunning circus production. This movie taps into our human desire to find a place we can belong, somewhere we can fit in, somewhere to call home. You see a picture of that kind of community flourishing, despite its faults, in this movie. It's the same kind of community that through the model of Jesus we endeavour to have here at CGS.

Through the death and resurrection of Jesus, God has created a new people for himself (Titus 2:14). A people that welcomes anyone in society, no matter who you are. For Paul writes:

"There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (Gal 3:28).

Just like Barnum welcomes all kinds of people into his circus, all are welcome in our school community.

More than just being welcoming, a gospel-centred community is a place where people are valued. You see in Barnum's circus family, people who once lived in fear now live in joy, people who were outcasts now have a place to belong. Barnum himself helps people to see the beauty in others' imperfection. The challenge for us in community is to see people the same way God does, to value them and love them for the way He has made them.

What you see in the movie as the story develops is that Barnum gets carried away by his fame and fails to see the value of what he already has. He devalues and disappoints the circus family that he created. Sadly, this may have been your experience of Christians, failing to value you as they ought and making you feel judged for who you are. But while sinful people may fail, God will never disappoint.

The spectacular acts and resounding songs all come from the wonderful collection of characters in P.T. Barnum's circus as they get to use the gifts they have been given. Flourishing in this community, all the characters are free to use their talents to entertain and amaze. This too is similar to what God offers as he brings together people of all ages and stages in life to serve one another.

In his letter to the Ephesians, Paul reminds us that "we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do" (2:10)

and so we should

"put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness" (4:24).

This is who we were made to be – God's holy people. And in his family, we can be who we were made to be.

I loved The Greatest Showman with all it's colour and joy, it reminded me of how good it is to be part of a community that values the Christian message. A place where all are welcome, everyone is valued and a place you can be who you were made to be. It's the best kind of community. It is a community that values respect.

Anglicare Ambassadors and Sleepout

Approximately 3,000 young Western Australians go to sleep homeless every night. Homelessness is a complex issue which is not straight forward to resolve for many of the young people who find themselves in this position.

The Anglicare Sleepout raises money for Anglicare WA's Street Connect service which works with young people such as these on the streets of Perth to help them get their lives back on track.

Each year Court Grammar sends a group of students from Years 10-12 to participate in this event. In the lead up the students run a range of activities to raise awareness of and funds for the cause. 
This semester the Year 7's have been reading the book "Wonder" by R J Palacio, here's why you should read it too.




Court Grammar Students Embracing a Future with Pride and Optimism

Yr 10 Pastoral Programme - Keys 4 Life

This semester many of the Year 10's completed their Keys4Life programme. Students took part in a 10 week programme and in this they faced many challenges and dangers of driving.

One key takeout for the students throughout the programme was the safety elements leading to the dangers involved with driving, one thing which we cannot recommend enough is the limitation of distractions on young drivers. According to the WA Government, there were 524 people killed or seriously injured in a inattention-related crash between 2016 and 2020. Unfortunately for many of our young drivers, music and phones are some of the biggest distractions. Here are some simple tips to avoid distractions and encourage our young drivers to follow some of these steps:

- Turn off your mobile phone when driving, or place in boot of the car.
- Adjust all vehicle controls before setting off.
- Turn off your music device when driving.
- Take a break rather than eat, drink, smoke or groom yourself while driving.
- Check a map before starting the journey to know what lies ahead.
- Ask passengers to be quiet if you are having difficulty concentrating while driving.
- Ensure pets are properly restrained in the vehicle.
- Recognise what makes you distracted and avoid that activity when driving.
- Make sure the vehicle's windscreens and mirrors are clean and unobstructed.

The Year 10's this semester have done a tremendous effort with 48 students completing their K4L course and receiving their K4L certificates on Thursday this week. The remaining students have been given some extra time to either complete the course, or attempt the test again. Out of the 48 students we proudly had three students achieve a perfect score getting 30 out of 30!!

- The maximum amount of CCS is increasing from 85% to 90%. Families earning up to \$80,000 will get the new maximum percentage of 90%.
- earning over \$80,000 may get a subsidy starting from 90%. This will go down by 1% \$5,000 of income they earn above \$80,000. The CCS percentage they are entitled to depends on their family's income. Families for each
- The income limit for CCS is increasing to \$530,000.
- The OSHC hourly cap rate will increase from \$11.15 to \$12.02 (for school-aged children)
- Families earning below \$362,408 with more than one child aged 5 or under in care can get a higher rate of CCS for one or more of their children.

From 10 July 2023, there are changes to Child Care Subsidy for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children. The changes mean they can get at least 36 hours of subsidy per fortnight, regardless of their family's income or activity level
