Exploring Christianity in Term 2:

A Journey into Faith, Symbolism, and Questions

After exploring Judaism during Term 1, this term our focus turned to Christianity—its history, beliefs, and key practices. Students explored several topics, including The Development of the Christian Movement, The Essence of Christianity, The Historical Jesus, The Christian Bible, and The Sacraments. One topic that particularly sparked curiosity and deep questions was the Sacrament of Baptism. So, what exactly is Baptism? And why is it so significant in the Christian tradition?

Baptism is one of the central rites—or sacraments—in Christianity. Sacraments are symbolic actions that outwardly express inner spiritual experiences or blessings. In the case of Baptism, it symbolizes a person's official entry into the Christian faith. It typically involves water—either through full immersion or by pouring water over the head—representing purification, renewal, and a spiritual fresh start.

This ritual can be traced back to John the Baptist, a key figure who baptized people in the River Jordan as a sign of repentance (turning away from wrongdoings). According to Christian belief, even Jesus Christ himself was baptized, giving the act profound significance. Christians see Baptism as being "reborn" into a life of faith, and as a cleansing from what is called original sin—a concept that refers to the inherited tendency to disobey God, tracing back to the biblical story of Adam and Eve.

It's important to understand that Christians don't believe Baptism makes someone perfect or sinless. Rather, it marks the beginning of a lifelong journey of faith and growth. Christians continue to make mistakes, but they see Jesus—who they believe died on the cross for humanity's sins—as the one who bridges the gap between themselves and God.

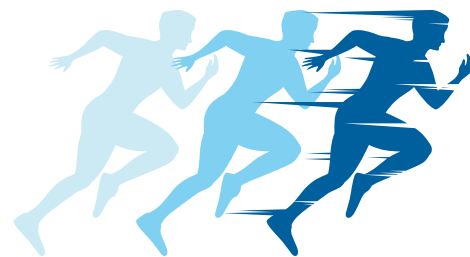
Unsurprisingly, many students were full of questions about Baptism—what it means, how it's performed, and whether it's similar to rituals in other religions. These conversations were rich and respectful, and provided a valuable opportunity for students to learn not just about Christian beliefs, but also about the importance of ritual, symbolism, and personal meaning in religious life.

We encourage parents to continue these discussions at home—your children may surprise you with their thoughtful questions!

CGS School Readiness Playgroup 2026

As we get ready to launch into the first ever CGS School Readiness Playgroup trial in October for children 0-3 years, we wanted to share with you some information from Playgroup WA outlining the benefits of being part of this group;

- Learning starts at least from birth – Learning happens through interaction and play
- Parents are their child's first and most influential educators
- Transition to school is a process which starts well before starting formal schooling

A substantial body of research over decades show that children's experiences prior to school build the architecture of their brains, influences their development and lays the foundation for learning, behaviour and health during their school years and beyond.

Research has shown that children who participate regularly in playgroups are much more likely to be developmentally on track when they start formal school. We know the substantial benefits of community playgroups for children and families. Playgroups in schools have all those benefits and have the additional benefits of the children and families together becoming familiar and confident in the school environment, getting to know other families likely to attend that school, and getting to know some of the staff who will be at the school. Children are more likely to feel safe and secure in the school environment when they do start formal school and their parent/caregiver needs to leave them. That sense of familiarity and belonging is expected to lead to a more successful school transition.

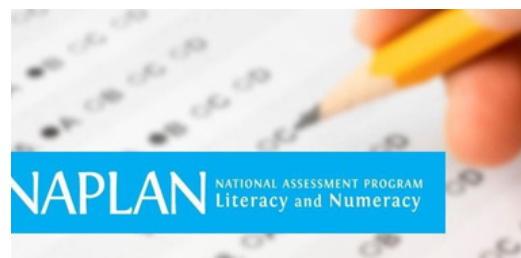

NAPLAN Results - Years 3 and 5

Our results in NAPLAN are an important measure of our students' educational growth because they tell us about our position of learning at both the national and state level while measuring the critical literacy and numeracy skills of our students. For parents, NAPLAN provides information on how their child is performing against national standards, not just against other children in a class.

For students, NAPLAN provides an opportunity for them to demonstrate what they have learned.

Please note that the school should receive the NAPLAN results towards the beginning of Term Three. Individual NAPLAN results will be sent to the school first, then the school will send individual reports to the appropriate families.

Students Led Conferences - Learning Journeys

On Monday, July 21 2025, the CGS students will deliver their 'Student Led Conferences'. The conference meetings will commence at 11.00 a.m., and conclude at 5.00 p.m. On this day, students will not attend school. However, students will need to be present at school for their personal student-led conference meetings.

What are SLCs?

Student Led Conferences provide opportunities for students to share evidence(s) of their learning journey. Consequently, during the conference, students explain their progress in some learning areas throughout the first semester, leading their families through an example of work with chosen learning experiences.

At CGS, Student-Led Conferences are attended by the student and their parent/guardian, and other adults the student would like to be present.

These conferences are led predominantly by students; however, supported by teachers, being both class and specialist teachers. Each conference session may range up to a half hour; class and specialist teachers may both be involved in these conferences. Your child's teacher may have already or will send a BOOKING invite so you may select a session for your child to share their learning journey.

Semester Reports

Our Semester One reports provide information on your child's academic, personal, social and emotional progress for Terms 1 and 2 of 2025. The left-hand side details work habits and attitude towards learning, while the right-hand side covers academic progress across the curriculum, reflecting all mandatory areas for Years Pre Primary to Y6 by the School Curriculum Standards Authority (SCSA).

Students are assessed through a combination of ongoing assessments, formal assessments and teacher judgment based on what has been taught. This means a student might show an A standard in one semester and a C standard in another due to different concepts being assessed.

Your child's Semester 1 Reports will be shared through SEQTA in the first week of the school holidays. If you wish to discuss your child's report, please contact your child's teacher in the first week of Term Three.

What's happening around the School

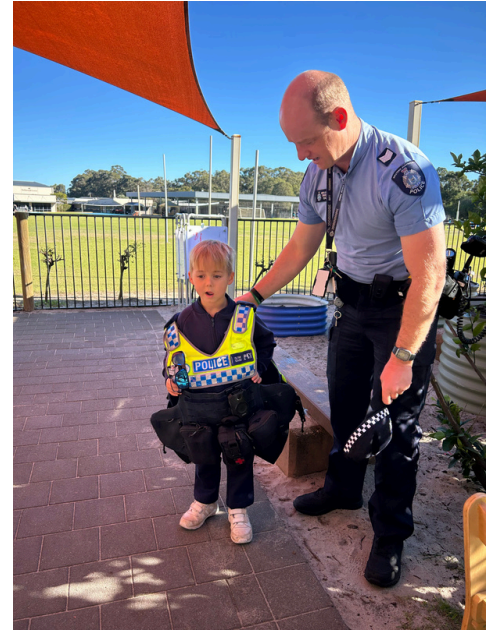
Kindergarten - Mrs Clues and Mrs Van den Dries

Has been selected to represent WA in the 2025 AFL 15s Boys Championships in Queensland in July-Aug.

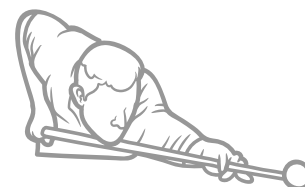


Madison White - Y10

Tonkin Highway Extension and Thomas Road Upgrade

Mundijong Road, between Kargotich Road and Adonis Street - Long-term Roadworks
To ensure the safety of road users and workers while the team constructs an access point to the future site office to the north of Mundijong Road, the speed limit will be reduced to 60 km/h between Kargotich Road and Adonis Street from mid-June 2025 until project completion. In addition, during any construction works, there will be intermittent stop/slow traffic management in place due to limited space in the area.

Access to the site office will initially be maintained using the existing entry point off Mundijong Road, with changes made as the project progresses.

These works are subject to change. Up-to-date information will be available through the [Main Roads Project website](#), [Travel map](#) and the [Tonkin Highway Extension and Thomas Road Upgrade Facebook page](#).

Please drive carefully and observe the road signage. Although these works are low impact, there is potential for longer than usual travel times and we encourage road users to plan ahead.

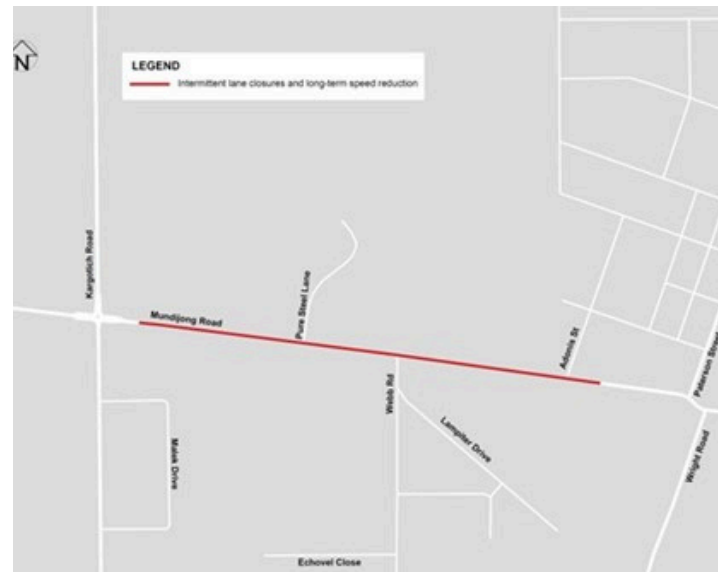
Tonkin Highway Extension and Thomas Road Upgrade
