Gary's vision quickly extended to all classes of disabilities, as it is today. A total voluntary organisation, which sets world's best practice for Disabled Surfers.

In the year we focus on Respect for Learning it is worth looking at a wholistic approach and how parents can help. One of the most vial ingredients to have for a successful learner is enough sleep.





In the bustling world of academia, where exams, assignments, and extracurricular activities vie for attention, one essential component often gets sidelined: sleep.

For teenagers, who are navigating the tumultuous journey of adolescence, adequate sleep is not merely a luxury but a fundamental requirement for optimal learning and cognitive function. Yet, it remains one of the most underrated aspects of academic success.

As parents it is crucial to recognize the pivotal role that sleep plays in facilitating learning among teenagers.

According to research by the Victorian Department of Health (see link below), Teenagers typically require between 8 to 10 hours of sleep each night to support their physical, emotional, and cognitive development.

Numerous studies have highlighted the profound impact of sleep on cognitive functions such as attention, memory, problem-solving, and creativity – all of which are critical for academic success.

Moreover, sleep plays a crucial role in emotional regulation and mental well-being, both of which are closely intertwined with learning.

So to help your child have a better nights sleep follow these tips

- Go to sleep and wake up at the same time each day.
- Get regular exercise, but do not exercise close to bedtime. Experts recommend allowing at least three hours between exercise and bed.
- Avoid caffeinated drinks, before going to sleep.
- Take time to unwind before going to sleep and avoid engaging in mentally stimulating activities such as work or gaming.

Create a pleasant sleeping environment: make the room dark, cool, and comfortable.

NAPLAN

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake. NAPLAN will be held in Term One this year, with the test window starting on Wednesday 13 March, 2024 and finishes on Monday 25 March, 2024. Please see the information brochure that was sent out last week to share what, what and how NAPLAN is used. Kiss and Drive

Thank you so much for your increased collaboration and care for the Kiss and Drive procedures. There are still some issues that we need to address to keep our students safe and the Kiss and Drive system functioning the best it can.



Kiss and Drive actions for a flowing system:

1. On hot days, as shade is limited in the Kiss and Drive area, consider having a spare hat in your child's bag if they are in the Early Years classes - where hats are left in the classroom.

Kiss and Drive drop off start at **8:05 am** and not before as there are no teachers on duty before this time. If you drop your child off earlier than this time, there will be no duty of care in this area so drop off(s) will need to be at the gates near the front office.

2. No parents should get out of their car if using Kiss and Drive. This delays drop off(s) for other students.

3. The Early Learning car-park has a time limit of 10 minutes. Please work with us as a team to ensure safety and care for all students as they arrive and depart at school.

4. If parking for more than 10 minutes, please use the parking bays near the administration office, off Bishop Road. Please do not use the Kiss and Drive parking bays for longer than 10 minutes.

5. Please remember that students need to be in the classrooms at 8:25 am.

6. Please remember that the Kiss and Drive gates close at 8:30 am.

7. Be mindful of the small children when driving through and parking in the Kiss and Drive area. We have many large cars in our community and many small children in our school. When reversing be extremely vigilant and drive slowly. Once again, thank you to those parents that have been awesome over the past weeks with 'drop off and pick ups'. We truly appreciate your care.

Keys4Life is a pre-driver education programme that allows students over 15 years of age to learn about safe driving. It will form a major part of the Year 10 Pastoral Care programme in 2024.

Recently, an information evening was held in the Pavilion in which Tania Gigg, a representative from the Road Safety and Drug Education Branch of the Department of Education gave valuable information and tips to those students and parents in attendance.

Those who could not make it to the information evening may find the following resources helpful:

•Let's Practise booklet - The Presenter referred to this book as an excellent starting point with a wealth of information.

•Keys4Life Parents Online - This self-paced course assists parents and caregivers in their roles as supervisors.

•Drive Safe Handbook - This is a comprehensive guide to the road rules that apply in Western Australia. The Learner's Permit test is based on this book. A copy has been given to each student for some bedtime reading.

•Drive Safe Handbook - Identity requirements for getting the Learner's Permit

•Five forms of identification are necessary for getting the Learner's Permit. Details can be found here. A copy has been sent home with each student.

•Keys4Life website - A hub of information with links to other resources specific to Keys4Life.

Year 10 students will complete all 10 Keys4Life lessons with their Pastoral Care Advisors before being allowed to sit the Theory Test during Term 2.

To add extra depth to the programme, Year 10 students will attend an excursion to the RAC Arena during Week 9 of Term 1 to attend RAC BStreetsmart event. Information has been sent to Year 10 families.

YEAR 11 BIOLOGY EXCURSION

Exploring Ramsar Sites: Year 11 Biologists Visit the Creery Wetland Reserve

This year marked a significant milestone as our new cohort of ATAR Biologists embarked on their fieldwork at the Creery Wetland Reserve, a vital component of the Peel-Yalgorup wetlands network. Recognised as a wetland of both national and international significance, this site was bestowed the prestigious title of 'Ramsar Site' back in 1990.



Despite the sweltering heat of February, the weather in Mandurah did not dampen spirits, offering a blend of rain and high humidity. Undeterred, our students enthusiastically dived into their tasks.

Their main focus lay in gathering data on biodiversity, distribution, and species richness within the salt marsh, dominated by samphire. Utilizing random sampling techniques with quadrats and employing systematic belt transects, the students meticulously collected data. Subsequently, they compared this data with information gathered from the woodland section of the reserve.

During their lunch break, students were pleasantly surprised by an unexpected encounter – one of the renowned inhabitants known as the Mandurah Giants, who happened to be on the edge of the reserve.




