

CHAPLAIN'S CHAT

REVEREND NOEL OAKY



Jesus was more than a teller of stories.

Neither was he a teller of Aesop type tales that had some moral message at the end.

Jesus used a style of storytelling than was common for his era, called parables.

The stories were about people and were told in the context of the time so it was easy for his listening audience to relate to the situations. His parables challenged the thinking and attitudes of the day. His most famous parable is the Good Samaritan.

The parable I am going to focus on today is the story of the rich fool.

This man was so rich in relation to his neighbours that he decided to build bigger barns to hold his harvest. In fact, he focussed his whole life on making himself rich, not just materially but indirectly.

Rich to him meant the size of his material wealth was a gauge of his social standing.

Just when the man had finished building his bigger barns, God called him home.

This man had been so focused on rich, he had ignored relationships.

For Jesus, relationship meant relationship with God, with family, and reaching out to strangers.

We live in a busy world. Busy seems to mark someone's importance, job value, people value. What you have or haven't got also seems to signify your "value."

I recently slept out with students and staff from Court Grammar at Optus Stadium to try and develop some understanding of people who feel that they have lost their "value" and are homeless. While we went prepared with warm clothes, quality sleeping bags and could go home afterwards, for many vulnerable people, this is their "everyday." The school community also raised in excess of \$13 000 to enable Anglicare to care for homeless people through "Street Connect."

My hope is that this "taste" of what it is like to be homeless has touched our students to look at their lives differently, by looking at life through the eyes of others. If this has happened then a cold night at Optus Stadium is worth more than any money raised.

Life is not always easy. Life's value is in relationships kept, made and cherished.

Jesus taught us much about how God sees His relationship with us, and how relationships should be our Number 1 priority in life because it is relationships that give life value.



Swimming Lessons - It was wonderful to watch so many children learn new skills at our recent swimming lessons during Weeks 3 and 4 of this term. The Armadale Aquatic Centre made an excellent venue for our swimming again this year. Children from Pre-Primary to Year 6 enjoyed and learned from the lessons as well as developing their organisational and time management skills. I would like to thank all staff and parents for their hard work during this time. As a dad, I know how challenging the washing routine can be each night! Last week and the week before, we handed out almost 300 certificates from the pool – well done to all!

Learning Journey Evening - Last week, I sent home information about our upcoming Learning Journey evening. This will take place on Wednesday 14 September from 4pm – 6pm. This is always a highlight in the School calendar as we all come together to share the wonderful learning taking place across the School. Please save the date and come along to this event if you can. Families of all Primary School children, Pre-Kindergarten to Year 6, are warmly invited. There will also be a choir performance and a sausage sizzle to enjoy.



Achievement Grades (Year 1-6)

Parents and caregivers often ask us how we determine the grades that children achieve on their semester reports. This is a complex process that staff work tirelessly on all the way throughout the year, not just at reporting time. As much as staff judgement is highly important, the driving force behind our formal assessment lies with what are referred to as Judging Standards and Achievement Standards. In basic terms, these are guidelines and boundaries set by SCSA (School Curriculum and Standards Authority). SCSA offer samples of what an A-E grade would look like in a given year/subject area and we moderate and compare

our learning against these. Parents will often be less than happy with a C grade. However, in learning terms, a C grade is the satisfactory standard for each year level and each subject. If a child achieves a C, they are exactly where they should be for their age. Sometimes, parents say I want them to get all B's. This may be true, but not always possible. For more information, any of our staff would be happy to chat through this alongside the assessment samples we hold for each child.

Uniform Reminders

I would like to offer a gentle reminder that our uniform expectations are detailed clearly in our Student Organisers (KG-6). Please remember that hats should be worn for play (unless it is exceptionally windy). Could I also ask that students do not come to school with nail polish and that sports uniform should not be worn with the formal uniform, and vice versa.



Anglicare Sleepout 2022



Court Grammar has established a wonderful reputation as a school that supports those in need. This year we had our largest group fundraiser and sleepout to raise funds for Anglicare WA and homeless youth. More than 40 students along with three dedicated staff (Mr Freel, Mrs Riseley and Chaplain Noel) gave up their Friday night and joined other Anglican schools at Optus Stadium.

The sleep out is open to our Year 10, 11 and 12 students each year and they participate in a number of fundraising activities leading up to the event as well as raise money individually. During the course of the evening the students participate in activities designed to raise their awareness on just what it must be like to be homeless.

The group raised in excess of \$13,000...our highest ever and an amazing achievement. This total contributed to the \$150,000 raised by the event.

Congratulations to all who participated and thank you to everyone who supported this wonderful empathetic group of young people.

St George's Cathedral Art Exhibition





This year we had three Year 11 ATAR Visual Art students exhibit their wonderful Semester 1 course work in St. George's Cathedral in Perth's CBD.

Year 2 Potato Games



Using iPads to create.....

This year the Year 3 students have been learning to use the iPads as a way of furthering their learning. Often children only use the iPad to consume, to play games created by someone else and to watch videos created by others. That is all changing! Just ask the Year 3s. They have been using Chatterpix to create fun ways to practice spelling, where they take photos of an object, draw a mouth on it and then record their spelling words so that the object says back their spelling words.

We are currently using Clips to turn the conversations that we write in literacy into videos where the students play a part and film, making their own little movies. We are using Numbers to create our very own Nyoongar audio dictionary . We are using Book Creator to author our own summaries of the class novel, "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory". Students are even using the Apple Pencils in an application called Sketches School to draw their own pictures that are then added into their books. We use Pages to create final copies of our research work that we have learnt to do online this year. We have even used Popplet to create mind maps to demonstrate our understanding in Science and to prepare ourselves for writing tasks.

The use of iPads as an extension of learning, allows the students to create professional looking work, collaborating together in small groups, exploring their creative genius, to not just remain consumers, but to begin to produce work for others. I am very proud of how far they have all come.

Primary Lego Robotics

In Term 2 this year, a new Lego Robotics programme commenced. This was highly anticipated by both students and parents in 2022.

I was asked whether I would be interested in running this programme and I was extremely keen to accept this opportunity. As a secondary science teacher who specialises in Year 11 and 12 ATAR Physics, I was keen to teach primary students for the first time. I started running a lego robotics after school activity in 2021 where I worked with students from Years 6 to 9 to compete against other schools in a world-wide tournament.

In Term 2, the programme started with Mr Fittons' Year 4 students as well as Mrs Van Den Dries' Year 5 students. The programme was based on giving students opportunities to play with various lego sets independently or in groups.

Both classes have thoroughly enjoyed the relaxing feeling that people get from making lego sets. The number of smiles I have seen and the excitement and anticipation shown by students each week has made this programme a huge success. I have handed out a countless number of lollies due to the incredible efforts shown by all students.



In Term 3 Mrs Van Den Dries, Year 5 students were lucky enough to get a second term doing lego robotics. This Term I started working with Mrs Maders' Year 4 students who have again shown a huge interest and passion for working with lego.



In Term 4, I will be working with all three classes as we review the lego robotics work created by the after school robotics team that will take part in the lego tournament.

I look forward to lots more fun and giving out lots more lollies to students who have fun, show great teamwork and make some amazing lego models.

Who are the main characters?




The main characters are Elsa, Anna, Kristoff, Olaf, and Hans.


Week 9, time & weather permitting, will see the regular riders go to another MTB park, Turners Hill, near Dwellingup.



DRUM BEAT



INFORMATION SHEET

Guide to young person / guardian / referrer regarding the Y's Drumbeat program.

DRUMBEAT, created by Holyoake, is a structured learning program that incorporates hand drumming into a wider system that helps children and young people to develop social and emotional skills in order to connect, or reconnect, with self and others.

DRUMBEAT stands for Discovering Relationships Using Music, Beliefs, Emotions, Attitudes, and Thoughts, and aims at promoting the building of positive relationships and social connection.

The Y WA offers DRUMBEAT to children in Year 6, running weekly during term time (starting Week 1). The program will run after school and be facilitated by Y WA youth workers who are trained in DRUMBEAT. For children who might need some extra support, supplementary case management (one-on-one support) is available through direct referral from the program.

The process from here:

1. Child is identified as potentially benefiting from the DRUMBEAT program.
2. Referral is discussed with the child and then completed. This referral can be completed in writing, or otherwise via phone with the Youth Services Coordinator (Sal Cleveray – 9479 5794).
3. Referral is sent to Program Coordinator (base@ymcawa.org.au).
4. Youth Services Coordinator will contact the referrer to acknowledge receipt and provide details as to the next program intake.
