# Lego Robotics 2021

In 2021 students were delighted to hear that there would be a Lego Robotics club that was run on Thursdays after school. The programme was run by Ms Dreher and myself, Mr Couzens.

The initial focus of the programme was to just have fun with over a dozen boxes of mixed up lego pieces that ranged from regular lego to lego technics. At peak we had over 20 active participants. We started off making battle bots which was lots of entertainment but we then heard about a Lego Robotics Competition which was run by Curtin University.

With no idea on how the competition worked, we were keen to enter a team. We named ourselves "We're Going to Court" and had a team of 10 very interested students ranging from Years 6 to 8.

Our robotics kit arrived two weeks late than planned which severely hampered our preparation for the tournament. We weren't however going to give up without a fight and when our kit finally arrived we remained positive and just had to work quicker.

Over the next few weeks we frantically made a robot to complete a series of missions that had to be programmed. Once we had a working robot we proceeded to plan which challenges to complete and begun the task of making a programme that would work.

Week after week passed. Along the way we had times of celebration when our robot completed challenges but then there were times of frustration when what worked one day suddenly didn't work the next day.

The last week before the tournament we worked over lunches and more days after school in an attempt to get a working programme. On the day before the tournament we finished with a partially complete programme and a robot that seemed to have a mind of its own and would not consistently complete challenges.

The day of the tournament arrived. Saturday, 20 November we had a team of 7 students to represent our School. Unfortunately Ms Dreher couldn't make it to the tournament day as well as a few students due to prior commitments.

When we arrived at Armadale Senior High School we were up against 48 other teams to see who would make it to the state titles. Students and parents were nervous especially knowing that we didn't have a working robot.

We had 30 minutes to practice and fix the programme before our round 1 battle. What happened next showed me the strength of our students. They worked together with such purpose and intent under the most extreme pressure, the last thing we wanted was to leave round 1 with no points.

Round 1 we planned a simple programme to complete a few challenges. With fingers crossed we all watched on as the robot started its battle. Nervous frowns were soon replaced with smiles as the robot successfully completed many missions and gave us a score of 105 points.

Students cheered and high fived each other. Our competitive spirit shone even brighter.

We had two hours until round 2. Students rushed back to the practice table and together worked with fierce intent to complete more programming to make the robot finish more challenges.

# Lego Robotics 2021 continued...

As round 2 started we watched in amazement as our robot completed one, then two, then three challenges and still kept going. We had a few minor incidents knocking over obstacles where we received penalty points but overall the robot worked. We waited intently as the judges announced 190 points. A massive cheer carried through the tournament room from our very excited students and parents. From what we were hearing 200 points was near the top of the leaderboard.

We had just 15 minutes until round 3. Students stopped celebrating and ran back to the practice table to fine tune the programming. We were now ready. Back to the battle room we went with a mission to not just do well but make the state finals.

Round 3 was incredible. The robot completed challenge after challenge and seemed to do a lot better than round 2. As the judges added up the points all 7 team members were gathered around the judge adding up the points. The judge called out "190 points". Students looked shocked and in total disbelief. We were still learning the rules so took it on the chin and accepted our score.

To celebrate we went to the café where I bought the students an iced chocolate each. I was still in shock as to how the students managed to complete, starting with a robot that was not working. The discussion around the table was whether we were going to make state finals to which was agreed was impossible at the start of the day.



In 2022 we know that our destiny is to not just make state finals but achieve well at state finals. I look forward to seeing this years participants and new students next year. We had no girls participate this year, so we are keen to find some interested girls to show the boys how lego robotics is really done.

'D' grades are not the end of the world and can happen across all year levels, but it would be remiss of us to award a 'C' where evidence is not in place to support this.

There are currently spaces available for Drum, Voice, Piano, String and Guitar lessons.


Lessons are charged at \$30 per half hour lesson and students will be on a rotation based timetable for the term.
