


### CHAPLAIN'S CHAT



# Exploring Evolutionary Trends in Primates: A Year 12 Human Biology Excursion to Perth Zoo

### 1B and 1C EXCURSION TO PERTH MUSEUM



# **Science Day**

This year, the topic for Science Week was inspirational: Future Science!

Our Year 7-10s all took part in a lesson which asked 'What will the world of science and technology look like in 50 years' time?' Will robots be in every household? Will we be going to work in autonomous electric vehicles, charged with the solar panels on our houses? Will the challenge of fusion reactors finally be solved? Will we be eating insect-based foods? Will we be mining asteroids? Will cancers be cured with bespoke DNA-based technologies?

Our Future Science primary incursion day was great fun. Mr Sullivan's Year 10 science class set up five brilliant stations for the younger children. Using a time machine (an ipad app) we showed the children what they 'might look like' at the age of 70. We showed them insect-based foods and had live crickets and giant stick insects in the lab. There were warring robots built from lego and programmed at school. We tested the grip strength of each child and took their temperature using datalogging technology and electronic sensors. And last, but not least, the students (and sometimes the teachers) generated electricity by pedalling a bicycle as fast as they could, and looked at how electricity is generated now and in the future.

Huge thanks to the Year 10 students, who repeated our science 'show' over and over again, on the day, and to our lab technician Ms Gallatly for her assistance. This was a day that none of us will forget!


















# **Year 5 Scitech and Space Incursion**


# **Mathematics Knockout Challenge**
