CHAPLAIN'S CHAT REVEREND NOEL OAKEY

Life never seems to run the way that we would like it to go.

I think that's because for some reason we believe that we can have complete control over everything that is happening

ning that "everyday

around us. The first weekend of February demonstrated to us that "everyday normal" can change rapidly, without warning with irreversible results.

In the Swan River, a group of young people enjoying the water and the joy of sharing that space with a pod of dolphins turned into the death of a young woman, attacked by an unseen shark. People living near the Eastern Turkiye/ Northern Syria border, a meeting place of three tectonic plates, were rocked by a 7.8 Earthquake. As I write the death toll is 4 000 and expected to be higher.

In both cases, the "everyday normal" changed in a moment. Yes, the young people recreating in the Swan would have known bull sharks inhabited the river, but "We're OK." The inhabitants of the region devastated by the earthquake are used to tremors, but not like this, not in the middle of winter....

For all the advances in society, controlling the unexpected, will remain unachievable. For some, because it is unachievable, they live in fear, being anxious everyday, just in case. Others, can throw caution to the wind and just live, sometimes at the expense to their own or others safety.

It has always amazed me that when "life doesn't run the way people want it to, " God is called upon to explain why, give hope or seek comfort. It amazes me because such a response can come from Christian and non-Christian alike.

Life is not easy at times, and the answer to the "Why" question is impossible to find. But God gives us hope and courage to go on, even when the going is tough. God will bring people into our lives to support us, even when going on makes no sense and we feel alone.

The four schools affected by the young student's death, the families waiting to know if their family members can be found dead or alive after the earthquake, they need our prayers to find hope...a way forward.



How do I best support my teenager at school?

As we start a new year of school, for a large number of parents it may be the first for them with a child entering Secondary school. Whilst the opportunities to be physically present may be less frequent than in their primary years, parents still play an important role in helping their teenage son or daughter be successful at school. We know that students whose parents or carers actively show an interest in their schooling will perform better. Helping our teenagers be successful is a joint effort. It is important that the students get similar messages from both home and school regarding expectations of behaviour as well as the value of education.

Here are five simple tips on how to give your teenager messages that you are interested in and value their schooling:

1. Attend school events

Simply by attending school events you give a message that you are interested and value what they are doing. As well, you will have a greater sense of your teenager's context at school when you are talking about school during the year. You will have a greater sense of their teachers and an increased understanding of the school's approach which will be helpful should your son or daughter come home disgruntled about something.

2. Stay connected

Be aware of how the school communicates and stay informed about their progress. Stay abreast of messages to do with their cohort and other school happenings through SEQTA, the website, Facebook and newsletters.

3. Homework

Support your son or daughter to set themselves up for success by establishing routines and spaces which allow them to complete the increasing demands of homework and study as they get older. If things get too much for them, encourage your teen to ask for help when it's needed. Most teachers are available for extra help before or after school, and also might be able to recommend other resources. CGS runs after-school classes in the Pavilion every day except Friday.

4. Diet and Sleep

Teenagers who eat a good breakfast and who have a good nights' sleep, free from interruptions from devices are more likely to do well at school. Teenagers need between 8 to 10 hours sleep a night. Work back from the time they need to be awake in the morning and establish a good routine in the evening.

5. Manage Devices

Staying up late at night using social media or gaming significantly hampers a teenagers' ability to cope and focus the following day. In addition, we see many social issues arise at school from what has occurred online over the weekend or at night. Be aware of what your teenager is doing on-line and have an understanding with them on how it will be managed. I would also encourage not allowing them to have their device in their bedroom at night.

Why Year 10 Semester One counts so much

Now that students have settled into their subjects for the year, if there is one piece of advice I can give to Year 10 students, it's that Semester One counts! The reason is, that early in Semester Two we begin talking about subject selections and some students will also consider applying for Off-Campus TAFE VET in Schools courses. Entry to courses will be based on student's performance in Semester One, hence my reminder that Semester One counts! I've now handed out to all students in Year 10 a booklet that outlines the prerequisites they need to have by the end of the Semester for entry into ATAR subjects in Year 11. Included in the booklet is also the criteria that TAFE will judge applications on.

NAPLAN

Secondary students in Years 7 & 9 will begin their NAPLAN testing on March 15. In preparation for this testing, students will participate in practice assessments to ensure they are familiar with the format



of the online tests. Students and parents are reminded that part of the NAPLAN testing is a listening component, and students are expected to bring earphones to plug into their devices. Please ensure your child's device is charged overnight and ready for assessments the next day.

WACE Practical Examinations for Physical Education Studies

The School Curriculum and Standards Authority of Western Australia have published the examination dates for the WACE practical exams. This will affect students studying ATAR Physical Education Studies in Year 12.



The practical examinations will be held during the first week of the Term 3/4 holidays. Candidates will be scheduled to take their examinations on one of the days from Saturday, 23 September to Sunday, 1 October inclusive. This will include weekends and public holidays. The exact day of the student's examination will be published by the School Curriculum and Standards Authority on 5 September. Please be aware these dates are set by the School Curriculum and Standards Authority. Feel free to contact myself or Mr Bristow if you have any queries regarding this.

Year 11 Biologists head to Ramsar Site

This year, for the first time, our freshly initiated ATAR Biologists carried out their Week 3 fieldwork exercises at the Creery Wetland Reserve, a part of the Peel-Yalgorup wetlands network. This is a wetland of national and international importance, and was designated a 'Ramsar Site' in 1990.







Even on a relatively cool February day, the mosquitoes were active, and we needed to spray up several times to avoid severe loss of blood.

The students collected data on biodiversity, distribution and species richness in the samphire-dominated salt marsh, using random sampling with quadrats and a systematic belt transect. We then compared data collected with similar information from a local inland bush reserve.











This was a good exercise in teamwork, in addition to supplying data for further analysis back at school. It is good to see our ATAR Biology intake into Year 11 getting properly stuck into the programme (and the mud).




Environmental/Sustainability Program

Sylvia and Tugba (Dental Therapists), Jeanet (Dental Clinic Assistant) and Nadia (Dental Officer) are working together to service the dental needs of enrolled children at our clinic.

Currently the Beenyup Dental Therapy Centre is open Wednesday to Friday from 8am to 4pm.

Our Services

The School Dental Service is a free service available to children from the age of 5-17 years old or to the completion of year 11 (whichever occurs first). Enrolment forms are sent out via the school admin team to any new students and all pre-primary students at the start of each calendar year (please note it is not compulsory for your child to be enrolled). If you receive one of these forms and wish to enrol please ensure it is completed and returned either to the school admin team or directly to the dental clinic.

What to Expect

Patients are predominantly seen by the Dental Therapists who provide a variety of services for your child(ren) as needed, and the services required are assessed on an individual basis.

Services available include examinations, referrals, scale and clean, preventive fissure sealants, Fluoride treatments, restorations (fillings) and extractions.

When an appointment is made with our clinic you may receive a letter in the post and a text message 2 working days prior. This message will come from an automated message service.

It is important that contact details are updated directly with the dental clinic as we cannot obtain any updates via the schools.
