

Last week the Year 11 Human Biology students had the luxury of practising dissecting skills and using their knowledge of the circulatory system to perform a heart dissection.




Year 8 Science



Measures and Graduated Scales

Students in 5T were recently challenged to make a measuring device out of 3 dimensional shapes.

The rules were:

Aim: To make a measuring cylinder/jug that shows at least every 100ml.

Equipment:

- Container
- Water

- Masking tape to write the scale on
- Pen
- Ruler

Using only this equipment the students were to make a measuring cylinder from the container they were given that had a graduated scale to show every 100ml of liquid. The measuring cylinder was only to be used once to help them. They were able to mark on where the 50ml measurements would go. It was a real head scratcher!




The birth, death and resurrection of Jesus changed our world.

Secondary School Student/Parent/Teacher Interviews

3-Way, Student/Parent/Teacher interviews will occur on the afternoon/evening of Tuesday 3rd May.

Parents can book a 10-minute time slot between 3:30 pm and 7:00 pm via www.schoolinterviews.com.au using the code: r9pmd.

All Interviews run for 10 minutes and parents are asked to respect the time scheduling required for such a large event. If additional conversation needs to take place at the conclusion of an interview, parents are requested to make arrangements with the teacher to meet at a later date. If teachers are booked out, parents are encouraged to contact the teacher via Direct Messages (SEQTA Engage) to arrange to meet with that teacher on an alternative date. Students are expected to attend in school uniform with their parents.

University Entry and Open days

University and tertiary provider Open Days provide students with an opportunity for greater insight into life as a tertiary student. Students can gain a greater understanding of how tertiary courses and curricula work and what courses and study modes are best suited.
