This School on the Road experience was enjoyed by all who attended and has helped the cohort get into the groove of Secondary School in a positive manner!



It has become apparent that missing the excitement of the first week and beginning the term a week later has caused many of us to find routines and procedures a bit later than usual. I am pleased to say that our primary children have found their feet, have established learning routines and have made good progress. However, I would

like to stress that our ethos of RESPECT is unwavering. We have experienced a higher rate of negative classroom behaviour than usual for the beginning of the year and this has been met with a clear message that our need to respect Ourselves, each Other, our Learning, our Environment and God are of the utmost importance. In this, we thank you for your ongoing support and understanding.



Learning Journey Folders ...

Learning Journey Folders went home last week for all Primary children. The Learning Journey Folder offers parents and caregivers a snapshot into the day-to-day learning within our various learning environments across the School. I would urge you strongly to take the time to read through this with your child and have a discussion

centred around learning and next steps. These folders come home in the second last week of each term. Staff and students work very hard putting together these work samples and they offer a great springboard for discussion at parent/teacher meetings as well as letting you see exactly where your child's learning is taking them.

Parent Teacher Conferences ...

Over the course of Weeks 8 and 9, teachers have been meeting with parents in order to discuss settling into routines, learning and assessment. If you have been unable to make an appointment or have been unable to find a time that you can come along, we will contact you in the new term in order to make such an arrangement. It is such an important part of the parent/teacher/student relationship triangle to have a formal meeting where strengths and development needs are identified. In following our reporting process, parent conferences are held in Term 1, student reports are issued in Term 2, a learning journey afternoon will take place in Term 3 and then the Semester 2 student report will be issued in Term 4.

Secondary School Student/Parent/Teacher Interviews

3-Way, Student/Parent/Teacher interviews will occur on the afternoon/evening of Tuesday 27 April.

Parents can book a 10-minute time slot between 3:30 pm and 7:00 pm via www.schoolinterviews.com.au using the code: npgpp.

All Interviews run for 10 minutes and parents are asked to respect the time scheduling required for such a large event. If additional conversation needs to take place at the conclusion of an interview, parents are requested to make arrangements with the teacher to meet at a later date. If teachers are booked out parents are encouraged to contact the teacher via Direct Message (SEQTA Engage) to arrange to meet with that teacher on an alternative date. Students are expected to attend in school uniform with their parents.

University Entry and Open Days

University and Tertiary provider Open Days provide students with an opportunity for greater insight into life as a tertiary student. Students can gain a greater understanding of how tertiary courses and curricula work and what courses and study modes are best suited. Beyond the learning experience, universities offer a large variety of co-curricular and cultural experiences. Each university is different, and I encourage students to engage in the Open Days on offer.

In 2021 many of the university and tertiary providers are offering both on-campus and virtual open days. I encourage students to engage in either of these experiences, so you are fully informed when it comes to deciding on where to study.

They would soon return and go with their parents or adult (the Departure) and cast away (throw into the firepit) what they had written.

After a few final words from a boy and girl representative reading a pledge on behalf of all of the students, everyone was treated to a lovely breakfast provided by Miss Pike and the hospitality students and served by our Year 12 Prefects. It was a wonderful community event and we look forward to the end of the year when our students participate in their 'Homecoming.'

Some of the reasons why schools run programmes like this...

- Lots of our boys are either under-fathered and/or exposed frequently to poor social media role models.
- Our girls are prematurely sexualised and exposed to unobtainable role models.
- Bubble wrapping of our young people prevents the growth through risk and challenge.
- Young people average 30 hours a week in front of screens at the expense of human connection.
- Sociologists are suggesting adolescence now lasts from 10 to 30 years of age.

Please note it is not compulsory to enrol if you already take your child to a private dentist and you wish to keep taking them there.

Services we can provide for your child are examinations, referrals, scale and clean, preventive fissure sealants, Fluoride treatments, restorations (fillings) and extractions.

If you think your child is already enrolled and they have not had an appointment in a long time, please contact us to ensure we have your correct contact details as schools are not allowed to provide us with personal details or change of address/phone number.
